Now the President of the United States has once again made a fool—and a mean fool, at that—of himself in a fit of temper, this time directed against a sixteen-year old girl who, because of her strong advocacy for action to slow the dangerous and escalating changes in the Earth's climate has attracted world wide attention of the best kind. But, of course, Trump's tweeted insults are nothing new, and it isn't really Donald Trump who should have our attention. Instead, we should now direct our blame and focus on the Republicans who continue to support him.
